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Theology and the Local Church in the Holy Land Conference (Palestinian Contextualized Theology Conference)

16th Session

Which Theological Thought for which Future?

16-18 January 2009, Bethlehem Hotel – Bethlehem

The 16th session of the conference began officially Thursday evening the 16th of January 2009 at 4:00 p.m. at the Bethlehem Hotel in Bethlehem. Leading religious and lay people from Bethlehem, Jerusalem and Galilee including the Mayor of Beit Jala, Engineer Raji Zaydan, and government officials attended the opening ceremonies. Biblical meditations and prayers by Melkite Fr. Ya'qub Abu Sa'da and Al-Liqa's Board member, Mr. Lawrence Sammour, inaugurated the ceremonies. H. B. Patriarch Fuad Twal, the Latin Patriarch in Jerusalem, H. E. Bishop Mar Sewirius Malki Murad of the Syrian Orthodox Church, H. E. Bishop Suhail Diwani of the Anglican Church and Dr. Geries S. Khoury, Director of Al-Liqa' gave the opening speeches stressing Muslim Christian unity, past and present, in the face of Israel's savage aggression against the people of the Gaza Strip. Present internal divisions among Palestinians are, to a great degree, responsible for the present disaster in the Gaza Strip.

Following a coffee and tea break, a major lecture on past and present local theological movements in the Holy Land was given by Rev. Dr. Mitri Rahib. Rev. Fr. Joseph Saghbini of the Melkite Church moderated the lecture. In depth questions, clarifications and

answers followed.

On the morning of the 17th of January, the session began with mediation and reflections by Fr. Dr. Ibrahim Shomali. He was followed by a major lecture on "New Christian thought for a new era and the pastoral letters of the Oriental Catholic patriarchs" by Fr. Dr. Rafiq Khoury. This morning session, which was received warmly by listeners, was moderated by Dr. Sharli Abu Sa'da of Beit Sahur. Many questions and discussions followed.

Following a coffee break, Fr. Dr. Jamal Khader, whose lecture on "Palestinian challenges facing local theological thought" was moderated by Mr. Elias Makhoul of Galilee, received the attention of listeners who posed many questions and asked for clarifications by the lecturer.

Following lunch and a break that lasted until 4:00 p.m., Rev. Dr. Hanna Katanacho spoke on "Theology of last days and the Palestinians," a topic that was moderated by Al-Liqa's Board member, Mrs. Hanadi Soudah. In depth questions, answers and clarifications followed. Mrs. Sima Ghawali, a friend of Al-Liqa' Center, led a study group about topics covered in the 2nd day conference: Participants expressed their concerns, worries and recommendations which were recorded

by Dr. Geris S. Khoury.

On Sunday, the 18th of January, the morning session began with Biblical mediation and reflections by Mr. 'Amer El-Baba from Galilee. He was followed by a creative lecture by Fr. Dr. Peter Dubrul, which was moderated by Al-Liqa' Board member Dr. Adnan Musallam. The lecture focused creatively on a viable and feelings oriented "Christmas narrative that must be presented to the Palestinians and society in large." The lecture was followed with a coffee break after which a panel was held with noted personalities like H. B. Patriarch Sabbah, H. E. Archbishop Elias Chacour, Dr. Bernard Sabella and Mr. Rif'at Qassis. The panel was moderated by Mr. Ziad Shlewet. Each

speaker focused on the future of Arab Christians in the Holy Land stressing in the process the need for Christians to be an integral part of Palestinian society. Mr. Qassis, in addition, also focused on a field survey of Christians in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip which gave the panel further depth and insight. Following questions, clarifications and reflections by panel members, Dr. Geris S. Khoury read the final communiqué of the conference. And the three day conference came to an end, concluded with a dinner for all those attending the conference.

Final Communiqué

Al-Liqa' Center for Heritage and Religious Studies in the Holy Land held the 16th Session of the Palestinian Contextualized Theology Conference, 16-18 January 2009 in the Bethlehem Hotel, Bethlehem. Leading religious personalities like H. B. Fuad Twal, Patriarch of the Latin Church in Jerusalem, H. B. Michael Sabbah, former Patriarch, Archbishop Elias Chacour Head of the Melkite Catholic Church, Bishop Mar Sewerios Malki Murad of the Syrian Orthodox Church and Bishop Suheil Diwani of the Anglican Church in Jerusalem, and other leading clerics and lay people from all walks of life attended this Christian Palestinian gathering.

Participants in the conference condemned in a unanimous gesture Israel inhuman and savage practices in the beloved Gaza Strip. Israeli military killed innocent children, carried on a scorched earth



campaigns against everything... mosques, churches, hospitals, schools, nurseries.

Participants blessed the steadfastness of our people on their soil while at the same time demanding their and our rights in the quests of all Palestinians for justice and peace.

Participants thanked people throughout the world who expressed solidarity with Palestinians and who demanded that their governments step in to stop this mad aggression by the Israeli occupying forces. Participants demanded Israeli immediate withdrawal from all Palestinian territories: Arab Jerusalem, West Bank and The Gaza Strip as well as the opening of all crossing points to the Gaza Strip.

Participants stressed the need for national unity as being the best tool in facing challenges and schemes against Christian and Muslim presence in this Holy Land.

Participants discussed several theological issues and concluded that there is a dire need for a local theology that fulfills the need of the faithful. Clerics and lay

people attending the conference stressed the importance of our steadfastness on our holy land despite the very difficult situation and the need for Christians to participate fully with their Palestinian people. Together they will make the future, liberate the land and establish a Palestinian state with Arab Jerusalem as its capital.

"Analysis of Israeli Election Results and the Future"

This lecture by Prof. Haidar was attended by community leaders, academicians, men, women, lay people, and clerics who were deeply interested in the outcome of the elections and its impact on Israeli society and on Palestinian Israeli relations.

The Israeli public, according to Prof. Haidar, has lost confidence in its politicians. This is seen in the results. Whereas in past days the largest party could get from 40-46 seats, these days the largest parties Kadima and The Likud could not get more than 28 to 27 seats respectively.

The newly formed cabinet, when it is formed, will comprise extreme right members. An indepth question and answer session followed.



"National Unity: Where does it stands?"

Many community leaders and academicians attended this crucial lecture which was followed by a question and answer session which lasted until 7:30 p. m. The theme of "National Unity" is one of the many major pressing issues facing Palestinian society.

Friday, 20 February 2009, The Hall of Mar Elias Church for Melkite Catholics – Haifa

The program was moderated by 'Afif Shleweit who spoke about the role of Christians in promoting Arabic culture.

Fr. Aghabios Abu Sa'da, parish priest of the Melkite Catholic Church in Haifa followed stressing the need for peace between religions in the East. He was followed by Mr. Nayef Khoury, Director of Al-'Ofoq, who criticized the Israeli television program that belittled Jesus and Virgin Mary. Christian – Muslim reaction to this program was also highlighted.

Bishop Boulos Marcuzzo, the Latin Patriarchate Vicar in Israel, spoke of the contributions of Christian Arab in Arabic civilization as seen in manuscripts that go back to 742 A.D. and role of Christian Arabs such as

We, Christian Arabs, are ignorant of our identity and heritage and that is why we feel like a "minority." Local theology is to renew confidence in the Christian Faithful. Christians are not a minority but are an integral part of the Arab people. The evening also included a question and answer session.

Palestinian community leaders and academicians, men, women, young people, Christians and Muslims attended this event that showed the film documentary, "Memory of the Cactus". This won the first prize in Dubai International Film Festival, January 2009. The director of the film, Mr. Hanna Musleh, was introduced by Dr. Adnan Musallam of al-Liqa Center, who commented on the film which revolves around the total destruction of three



Palestinian villages near the Latroun Monastery in the 1967 war. The villages were Emaus, Yalo and Beit Nuba and were populated by more than 5,500-Palestinians. Mr. Musleh spoke about the various Palestine documentary films he directed. In addition, he answered the many questions there were posed by the audience.

They visited Al- Liqa' Centre and met with Dr. Khoury who spoke to them about the work of al-Liqa Center and issues of peace, reconciliation, occupation and religious tolerance.

A delegation comprising 12 undergraduate and graduate students who are attending Jerusalem University College (JUC) in East Jerusalem visited the Center, Saturday, 28 March 2009. The task of selecting Jerusalem as the Capital of Arab culture aims to pinpoint the cultural identity of Jerusalem, the true capital for Palestinian Arabs, both Muslims and Christians.

Jerusalem has always been the model of Muslim Christian coexistence. Internationally, Jerusalem has been a nursery for world cultures throughout the ages.

Activities revolving around the celebrations include a main idea, that is "to focus on the city's symbolism" which does not accept containment or occupation but underlines resistance against Israeli occupation and its attempts to undermine the Arabic, Islamic and Christian identities and replace them through the Judaization process.

Activities also aim to support those Jerusalemites who are threatened by expulsion, expropriation

of lands and destruction of homes and to bring the attention of Muslims and Arabs to the need to lend a helping hand to Palestinian people under occupation so they can obtain their freedom and independence as other peoples in the world.

Activities include works in poetry, essay, children and adult literatures, artifacts, documentary films, academic publications, popular songs, religions and national songs as well as distinguished theatrical works that reflect Arab continued presence in Jerusalem that stretches since the dawn of human history.

Committees have been formed throughout Palestine and in Arab countries and non-Arab countries as well in order to make this sublime occasion a truly unique one.



Al-Liqa' Center's Headquarter 54-56 Al-Quds Jerusalem Str.

The Center is located less than 200 meters to the southwest of Rachel's Tomb at 54-56 Al-Quds Jerusalem Street. After passing the Jacir Palace Intercontinental to the right on the Hebron-Jerusalem Rd, take a right turn at the first intersection at the end of which Al-Liqa' Center is situated on the right side of the street
